The course provides the students with an introduction to key concepts in the field of development economics. We will discuss the meaning of the term 'development' from a macroeconomic perspective, and consider the main issues surrounding its measurement. We will dwell into the determinants of a country's income, and consider their implications for the international distribution of income. 6808 000 000 85488 - 0 - POLITICAL POWER BEYOND STATE BOUNDARIES: MIGRATION, DEVELOPMENT AND HUMAN RIGHTS**Obiettivi:**

The aim of the course is to analyze from a historical-political point the impact phenomena such as migration, international legislation on human rights and foreign aid policies, commonly known as development cooperation policies, have had on the traditional conceptualization(s) of political power. The course will address and discuss the main traditional doctrines and models of citizenship and human rights, State sovereignty and international relations together with the more recent critical approaches to them. Particular attention will be paid to the investigation of cross-cutting issues such as the relationship between universalism and cultural differences, order and justice, exclusion and inclusion, political and humanitarian spaces and actors. At the end of the course the student knows the main theoretical approaches to citizenship and human rights, State sovereignty and international relations and he/she is able to critically discuss their assumptions and limitations in relation to global issues such as migration, foreign aid policies and human rights.

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6808 000 000 98927 - 0 - ANTHROPOLOGY OF CLIMATE CHANGE**Obiettivi:**

The course introduces students to anthropological contributions to understanding anthropogenic climate change and towards efforts to address its effects and its causes. Students will learn to apply anthropological theory to key themes in the field of climate change such as the production of scientific knowledge, activism, conflict, political debate and diplomacy. They will become familiar with indigenous, gendered and decolonial perspectives, the role of local ecological knowledge for producing evidence and for adaptation and mitigation, and holistic approaches to energy technology transitions. Students will learn to articulate climate change in terms of ecological dependencies between human communities and soil, air, forests and water. They will engage actively with ethnographic case studies to be read in advance of class discussions, as a basis for developing critical insight into the multidimensional problem of climate crisis. Through the requirement to produce brief original studies on the subject, they will gain independent research and presentation skills

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6808 000 000 B8846 - 1 - ETHNOGRAPHIC METHODS AND RESEARCH ETHICS**Obiettivi:**

This course equips students with foundational training in research methods, focusing on ethnographic approaches, to support original research endeavours. Emphasizing ethical standards, the course ensures that students understand how to design and conduct research in accordance with academic norms, applicable legislation, and international data protection laws, including those of the EU and other relevant regions. Students will gain practical knowledge of key research techniques and learn to navigate the ethical complexities of fieldwork, including informed consent, confidentiality, and responsible data management. At the end of the course, they will apply their skills to develop and present ethically and methodologically robust research proposals. Through a combination of theoretical insights and hands-on practice, this course provides a comprehensive foundation for ethical and effective research across diverse contexts.

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6808 000 000 85491 - 0 - GEOGRAPHY OF THE EURO-MEDITERRANEAN REGION**Obiettivi:**

The course aims at providing students a comprehensive vision of the role played by the Euro-Mediterranean area as a whole, following the different stages of its evolution.

Specific attention will be paid to the peculiar mixing up of politics, space, cultures, and technics, which generated an original long-standing model whose today's crisis and mutation are keys to understand the global issues at stake.

By the end of the course, students have basic knowledge, fundamental references concerning the topics at issue, and critical skills, put into historical perspective, about the main geographical models concerning the relationship between environment, landscape, and urban civilization in Mediterranean and Eurasia.

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6808 000 000 C9474 - 1 - HISTORY OF CULTURAL DIPLOMACY

Obiettivi:

The course focuses on the historical evolution of cultural diplomacy from the crisis of the 1930s until the end of the Cold War. Cultural diplomacy, as soft power and as exchange of ideas and cultural heritage, will be studied in its effort to strengthen sociocultural development and multilateral cooperation.

By the end of the course, students will be able to reconstruct the contribution of cultural diplomacy to international relations during the period of the two World Wars, throughout the Cold War, and in the post-bipolar era. The student acquires the tools to apply practical models of cultural diplomacy (organization of events, circulation of university students and intellectuals, youth exchange programs, scientific cooperation) and to understand their interaction with traditional forms of diplomacy

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6808 000 000 B1848 - 0 - SOUND ECOLOGIES AND THE ANTHROPOLOGY OF SUSTAINABILITY

Obiettivi:

This course introduces a new perspective on sustainability by exploring anthropological ideas through case studies focusing on sound and music. Anthropologists and ethnomusicologists have long been interested in how sound and music express different ways of being in the world, of experiencing and imagining existence, and of communicating across species divides. From ancient cosmological ideas about the music of the spheres to the spiritual and medical effects of trance, music may offer alternative ways of knowing and being. Imitation of birdsong and animal calls is important for forest peoples' hunting techniques, and the 'silent spring' heralded the birth of the environmentalist movement. Drumbeats and protest songs animate demonstrations of resistance to environmental destruction. Technological listening and 'sounding' are among the tools scientists use to monitor biodiversity and environmental change. The course will train students to pay attention to the ways in which different senses can condition their perceptions of the environment, and to the part in which music and sound, and the materialities of musical production and sound making, play in human lived worlds. They will develop awareness of the insights that an acoustic approach can bring to questions of environmental sustainability. Students will also have the opportunity to learn to use sound recording to carry out ethnographic research.

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6808 000 000 B8845 - 1 - TERRAQUEOUS WORLDS: ANTHROPOLOGY OF THE SEA AND COASTAL COMMUNITIES

Obiettivi:

Oceans and coasts are undergoing profound transformations due to climate change and human exploitation. This course introduces students to the anthropology of the sea and coastal wetscapes, examining the lives of fishers, ports, shipping, and coastal heritage. It also explores critical studies of maritime infrastructures, colonial and industrial legacies, and multispecies entanglements in coastal areas such as lagoons, deltas and wetlands. Through the histories of anthropogenic coastlines, students will critically analyse conventional divisions between land and sea, exploring "wetness" as a lens for understanding human-environment interactions. The course will also engage with key issues in ocean governance and examine the maritime ecosystems vital for survival, addressing topics like rising sea levels, biodiversity loss, environmental displacement, and the interconnected crises represented by global warming. By integrating perspectives from anthropology, environmental studies, and history, students will gain an interdisciplinary foundation to understand culture, ecology, and survival in coastal and marine worlds.

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6808 000 000 95704 - 0 - ANALYSING CULTURAL CHANGE AND CULTURAL TRANSMISSION: A METHODOLOGICAL PERSPECTIVE

Obiettivi:

Human culture is the result of cumulative processes of transmission, innovation, environmental and socio-economic pressure, human migrations, and the exchange of objects and ideas at different spatial and temporal scales. The course focuses on both theoretical and methodological questions raised by current approaches to the study of cultural change, and adds a focus on the basic statistical tools currently used to analyze data generated in the fields of cultural heritage, archaeology, anthropology, and other social sciences. By the end of the course, the student has acquired skills that facilitate the systematic description of empirical evidence and the exploration of diversity in different contexts. By the end of the course, students will be able to identify the major populations of the Caucasian region, along with their ethnic and linguistic identities. They will also acquire a comprehensive understanding of the historical dynamics that have shaped the relationship between the Caucasus and Iran, from the Achaemenid period through to the complex geopolitical realities of the present.

By the end of the course, students will be able to interpret these emergent socio-spatial apparatuses in relation to the ideas of wilderness, Anthropocene, sustainability, and the evolving notion of the universal rights of individuals, communities, and newly acknowledged agencies such as animals, flora, and natural features.
