

TEACHING REGULATION OF THE DEGREE IN

L-41 [STATISTICAL SCIENCES]

Bologna Campus

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ART. 1 ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS OF THE DEGREE PROGRAMME

a. Required knowledge

In order to be admitted to the Degree Programme, it is necessary to have a High School Diploma of five years duration, or another qualification obtained abroad recognized as suitable, or a four-year upper secondary school diploma and the relevant supplementary year or, where no longer active, the assigned educational debt.

The following basic knowledge and skills in the logical-mathematical and linguistic areas are also required.

For the curricula held in Italian

- Good knowledge of written and spoken Italian

- Logical-mathematical skills.

For the curriculum held in English

- Good knowledge of English (level B1)
- Logical-mathematical skills.

Assessment of the knowledge

This knowledge is verified through a test that will take place in the manner described on the website of the Degree Programme (and that can be repeated on several occasions).

The modalities of assessment of required knowledge are defined at the paragraph Admission Modalities.

If the verification is not positive, specific additional training obligations (OFA) are indicated, the fulfilment of which is subject to specific verification.

Failure to meet the learning requirement by the date decided by the Academic Bodies and published on the University Website implies the repetition of the registration to the same year.

Assessment of knowledge and language skills

Access to the Programme is provided for the assessment of knowledge and skills in the English language level B1 for the curriculum held in English.

b. Admission Modalities

The Degree Programme adopts a restricted local access in relation to the available resources. The number of students enrolled and the procedures for carrying out the selection will be made public each year with the relevant call for application.

The required knowledge and competencies are assessed through a written test.

If the assessment of knowledge and skills in mathematics is not positive, an additional learning requirement will be assigned, consisting of the attendance of any mathematics adaptation courses (the dates of which will be published on the Programme website) or the completion of individual activities defined by the Degree Programme Board.

ART. 2 MOBILITY RULES BETWEEN DEGREE PROGRAMME CURRICULA

The Degree Programme is divided into curricula.

The student can make the choices indicated in the teaching plan, with the methods indicated in the plan and in the terms published by the University Website.

It is allowed to pass between the curricula provided, delivered in Italian, within the terms disclosed through the University Website. In the case of a change from a curriculum provided in Italian to that provided in English, or vice versa, the student must pass the admission test. It is not possible to recognize exams in Italian with the only exception of the "Analisi Matematica" exam.

ART. 3 INDIVIDUAL STUDY PLANS.

It is possible to submit individual study plans with the methods, criteria and terms disclosed through the University Website.

The individual study plans, approved by the Degree Programme Board, cannot, however, disregard compliance with the legal system and guidelines defined by the competent bodies.

If the study plan provides for the choice of learning activities activated by restricted access Programmes, admission to these courses must also be approved in advance by the restricted access Degree Programme Board on the basis of previously identified criteria.

ART. 4 IMPLEMENTATION OF LEARNING ACTIVITIES AND TYPES OF TEACHING ACTIVITIES

The enclosed teaching plan indicates all the learning activities and their division into hours of classroom teaching, practical exercises or internship, as well as the type of teaching methods. Any further information will be published annually on the University Website.

ART. 5 ATTENDANCE AND PREPARATORY ACTIVITIES

Compulsory attendance of the teaching activities is indicated in the attached teaching plan, together with any preparatory activities involved in the individual learning activities. Compulsory attendance is established annually by the degree program during the presentation of the teaching plan, and is notified to the students via the University Website before the lectures start.

ART. 6 FLEXIBLE PATHWAY

The student can opt for the flexible path that allows to complete the course of study in a time longer or shorter than the normal duration according to the methods defined in the University Teaching Regulations. The training activities provided by the course of study, in case of necessary deactivation, can be replaced, to ensure the quality and sustainability of the teaching offer.

ART. 7 ASSESSMENT OF LEARNING ACTIVITIES

The attached teaching plan indicates all cases in which the learning activities end with an exam, marked with a score out of 30 or by simple "pass" in the case of having acquired the relative competencies.

The assessment methods (oral, written or practical exam or any combination thereof; individual or group exams) are laid down annually by the Degree Programme during the presentation of the teaching plan and notified to the students via the University website prior to start of the programme.

ART. 8 ELECTIVE LEARNING ACTIVITIES

The Degree Programme considers all the training activities activated by the Degree Programmes in the area of Economics, Management and Statistics consistent with the training project.

If the student chooses a training activity other than those considered consistent, according to the aforementioned predetermined criteria, he must apply to the Study Course Council in the terms provided annually and made known through publication on the University Portal.

The Board will evaluate the consistency of the choice with the educational path of the student.

ART. 9 CRITERIA FOR THE RECOGNITION OF CREDITS ACQUIRED IN DEGREE PROGRAMMES IN THE SAME CLASS

Credits acquired in a subject area are recognised up to the number of credits indicated for the same subject area (indicated in the enclosed course structure diagram).

Residual credits may be recognised by decision of the Degree Program Board, with regard to their consistency with the study plan.

ART. 10 CRITERIA FOR THE RECOGNITION OF CREDITS ACQUIRED WITHIN DEGREE PROGRAMMES IN DIFFERENT CLASSES, FROM TELEMATIC UNIVERSITIES OR INTERNATIONAL DEGREE PROGRAMMES

The acquired credits are recognised by the Degree Programme Board according to the following criteria:

- analysis of the course contents

- assessment of the coherence of the scientific-disciplinary fields and the contents of the learning activities in which the student has acquired the credits with the specific learning outcomes of the Degree programme and the individual learning activities to be recognised, in any case pursuing the aim of promoting student mobility.

The credits are recognized up to the maximum number of university credits provided for in the program (indicated in the enclosed course structure diagram).

Residual credits may be recognized by decision of the Degree Program Board, with regard to their consistency with the study plan.

ART. 11 CRITERIA FOR THE RECOGNITION OF EXTRA-UNIVERSITY COMPETENCIES AND SKILLS

Competences acquired outside the university may be recognised in the following cases:

1. in the case of professional knowledge and skills certified in accordance with the legislation in force in matter;

2. in the case of knowledge and skills acquired in post-secondary education and training activities for which the university has contributed.

The request for recognition will be evaluated by the Degree Programme Board taking into account the indications given by the Academic Bodies and the maximum number of recognizable credits fixed in the teaching regulation of the Degree Programme.

The recognition may take place if the activity is consistent with the specific training objectives of the Degree Programme and the training activities that are recognized, also considering the content and duration in hours of the activity carried out.

ART. 12 CURRICULAR INTERNSHIP

At the student's request, the Degree Programme provides for the possibility of carrying out a curricular internship according to the procedures established by the University's General Regulations and international mobility programmes.

Art. 13 FINAL EXAMINATION MODALITIES

a. Characteristics of the final examination

The final exam consists of an oral and written report agreed with a supervisor.

This report may also cover the previous traineeship activity of the student. The drafting of the report and its presentation are aimed at highlighting the ability to study and apply the knowledge and skills acquired by the student, as well as his ability to communicate them.

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b. Modalities of the final examination

The final exam consists of a written paper agreed with a teacher of reference, with subsequent public discussion. The Degree Programme Board may provide for the award of bonus scores that will be noticed through the University website.

The procedures for the drafting of the report, together with the operational guidelines and criteria for the final evaluation are made known through the University portal.
